

On the Feast of Epiphany, which we celebrated on Sunday 4th January, we bade a fond farewell to Helena as she retired from her role of Vicar of our parish. The church was full as many came to show their appreciation for her many years of faithful service to the church, to our schools and to the community, and for all the support and kindness she has shown to those going through hard times. The party was a great success with a wonderful spread of food provided by many people from across the three villages. The work of the church goes on as before, and the services will take place as usual. This includes Messy Church that meets in Findon Village Hall on the first Tuesday of the month. As the position of Vicar is now in vacancy it is actually the Church Wardens who run the parish, though I am available to take services and to be there for anyone who would like to speak to me.

Easter is very early this year (5th April) so we begin our Lenten observance early too, with Ash Wednesday falling on 18th February. Although we might not think of Lent as something to look forward to, I personally find it a very useful time of reflection and preparation for Easter. Used well, it can be a time to take stock, which I think we all need in our busy lives. Fasting is optional (!) but some people find that focuses the mind and has its benefits, providing any savings are put to good use.
